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Introduction

The story of Joseph, found in Genesis chapters 37 to 50, is one of the most remarkable accounts in all of Scripture. Explanation and Meaning

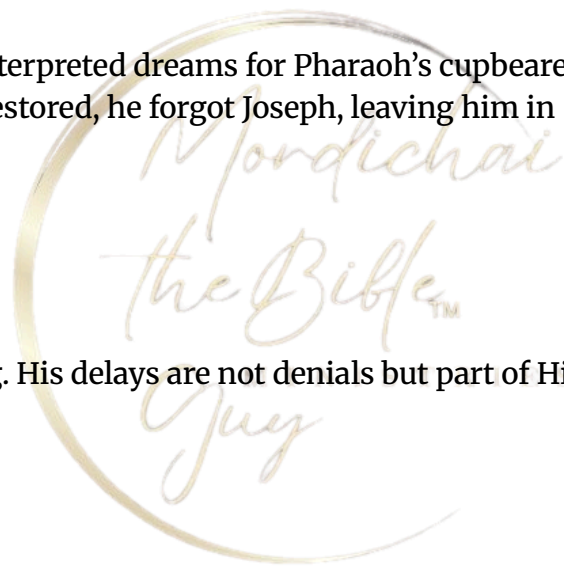
God was preparing Joseph in the waiting. His delays are not denials but part of His timing.

Explanation and Meaning

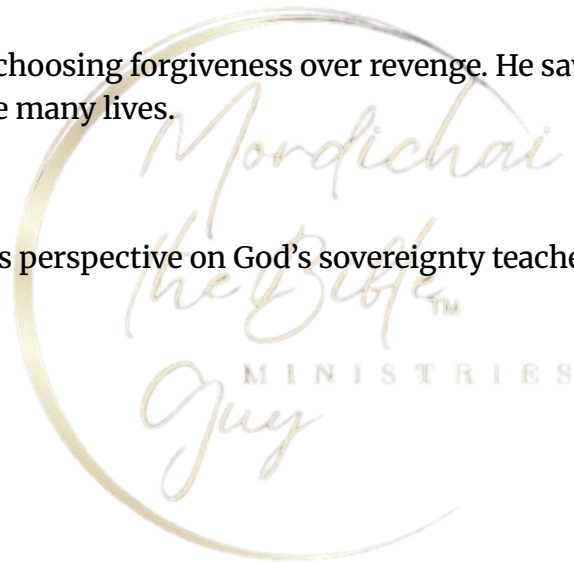
Forgiveness unlocks restoration. Joseph's perspective on God's sovereignty teaches us to let go of bitterness.

Explanation and Meaning

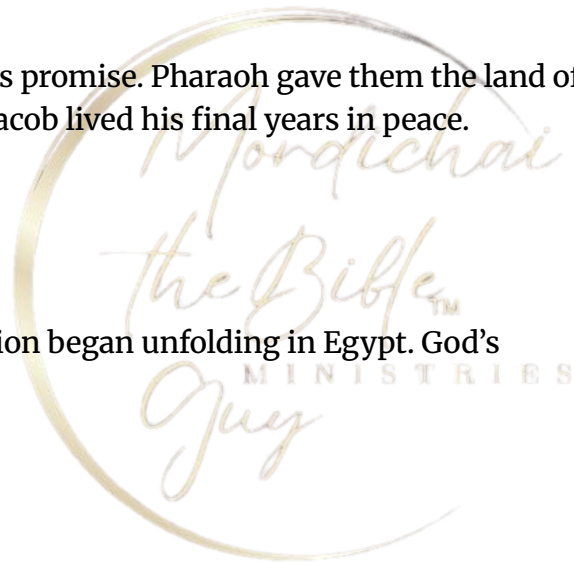
God's promise to make Israel a great nation began unfolding in Egypt. God's faithfulness continued.

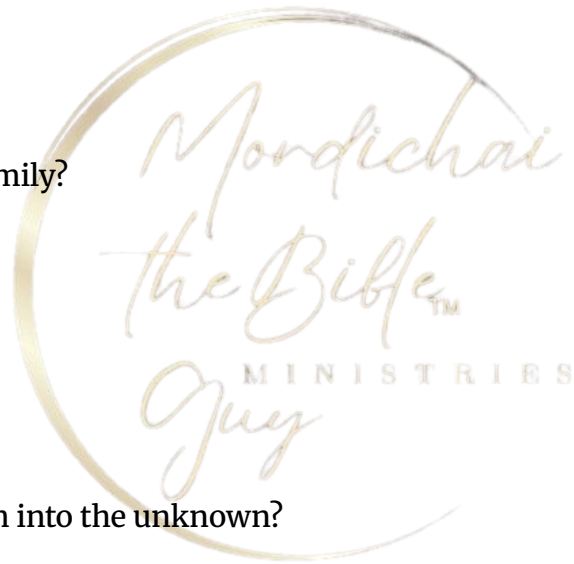

Explanation and Meaning

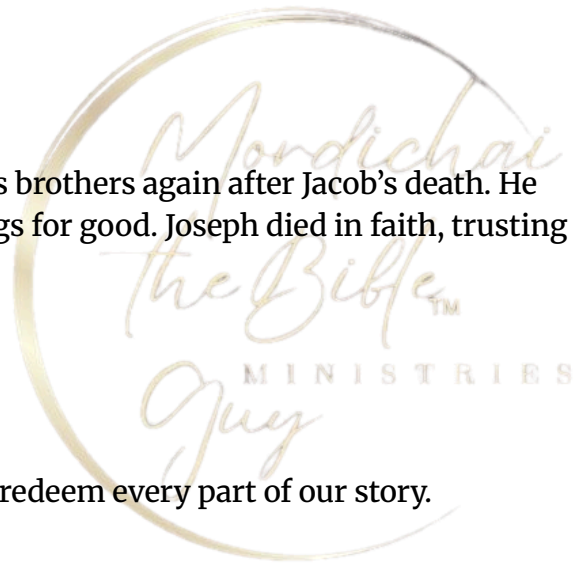
Joseph's legacy points to God's ability to redeem every part of our story.
