### Chapter 2: Surrendering to God's Will

### "Your kingdom come. Your will be done on earth as it is in heaven." (Matthew 6:10, NKJV)

This line of the Lord's Prayer is an invitation to surrender. It is a recognition that God's ways are higher than ours (Isaiah 55:8-9) and that true peace comes from trusting His plan. Jesus exemplified this surrender in the Garden of Gethsemane, where He prayed, "Not My will, but Yours, be done." (Luke 22:42, NKJV). Even in the face of suffering, He submitted to the Father's will, demonstrating that obedience is an act of love and trust.

Praying for God's kingdom means desiring His reign not only in the world but in our hearts. It is an active prayer—one that calls us to live differently, to embody His love, and to be His hands and feet on earth. Jesus Himself demonstrated this dependence. Before making important decisions, He spent time in prayer (Luke 6:12-13). In the wilderness, He resisted temptation by declaring that "man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceeds from the mouth of God." (Matthew 4:4, NKJV). His example teaches us that our greatest sustenance comes from time spent with the Father.

This part of the prayer invites us to trust God fully—not just for material provision, but for wisdom, guidance, and strength for each day.

### **Chapter 4: The Call to Forgive**

### "And forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors." (Matthew 6:12, NKJV)

When we pray for forgiveness, we acknowledge our own need for grace. But Jesus ties our forgiveness to the way we forgive others. This is not about earning God's mercy but about reflecting it. Just as we have received undeserved grace, we are called to extend it to others.

Unforgiveness binds us, but grace sets us free. The more we grasp the depth of God's forgiveness, the more we become willing to release resentment and walk in love.
